
# 24HR SNAPSHOT 2021 INTERIM STREET CENSUS

## **METHODS**

The count was held during the COVID-19 pandemic, while Winnipeg was at Provincial Pandemic Response Level **Red: Critical.** Given public health restrictions, the count was held with limited data collection methods. As a result, findings cannot be compared to those of full Street Census Point in Time Counts from 2015 or 2018.

Over a 24-hour period, project partners collected a limited set of information from emergency shelters, transitional housing, 24/7 safe spaces, resource centres, encampments, and unsheltered locations. Not every sheltering or transitional location in Winnipeg participated in the survey.

### **KEY DEMOGRAPHIC FINDINGS**

Those who stayed at emergency shelters included a high percentage of men (71%), with more than half identifying as Indigenous. People experiencing chronic homelessness<sup>\*</sup> represented approximately 15% of all shelter users. While almost half (46%) of emergency shelter users were aged 25 to 49, a concerning finding is that 4% were dependent children under age 18.
