		Participants are also offered access to the Buried in Treasures support group, which helps them develop strategies to manage hoarding behaviors and maintain stable housing. In addition to therapeutic and practical supports, A & O provides emergency funds for clean-ups, advocates on behalf of clients with building management, and offers temporary accommodations when needed. The project also assists individuals leaving abusive situations, ensuring they have access to safe and appropriate housing options. Through these comprehensive and compassionate services, This Full House helps older adults maintain their housing, improve their well-being, and strengthen their connection to community.	
Aboriginal Health and Wellness Centre	A Place To Call Home	A Place To Call Home (APTCH) is a Housing Support and Support Services project operated by the Aboriginal Health and Wellness Center. This project employs the Housing First approach, emphasizing rapid placement in housing without preconditions, as a core strategy to address homelessness. APTCH integrates traditional Indigenous healing practices symbolized by the Medicine Wheel with Western methods of care, grounding its services in a philosophy that respects and incorporates holistic, culturally-informed frameworks. This blend of traditions and modern practices aims to create a supportive environment that respects the cultural identities of its participants.	

The services offered by A Place To Call Home include a harm reduction approach and intensive case management, tailored to meet the unique needs of its constituents. By providing a comprehensive suite of services within a culturally sensitive framework, APTCH effectively supports individuals in achieving stability and wellness, aligning with its commitment to fostering lasting positive change in the lives of those it serves.

Stepping Forward

Stepping Forward is a comprehensive Housing Support, Prevention/Shelter Diversion, and Support Services program operated by the Aboriginal Health and Wellness Center (AHWC). This initiative is focused on preventing homelessness and supporting individuals who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness. By stabilizing their circumstances, Stepping Forward enables participants to move beyond emergency needs and embark on a pathway towards self-sufficiency and an improved quality of life.

Stepping Forward's multi-faceted service structure allows it to effectively cater to a broad spectrum of needs within the community. Auxiliary Services provide essential training and workshops, Non-Housing First Supports offer direct assistance to those not eligible for housing first programs, and Drop-in Services furnish immediate and accessible support.

The program upholds principles of dignity, respect, and cultural sensitivity, critical in

Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs	Fresh Start (HF)	Fresh Start is a Housing Support and Support Services program operated by the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs (AMC). As an Indigenous Housing First initiative, Fresh Start is tailored to assist a caseload of 42 Community Members by providing comprehensive support aimed at securing and maintaining stable housing. The program focuses on delivering personalized assistance to each participant, facilitating successful housing placements and long-term stability. The program extends beyond just housing support, incorporating services that promote Economic, Social, and Community Integration. These services are crafted to aid participants in achieving financial independence, fostering connections within their communities, and participating in social activities that contribute to their overall well-being. By addressing multiple aspects of life, Fresh Start enhances participants' ability to integrate successfully into society, promoting not only housing stability but also enriching their community involvement and social relationships. New Beginnings

New Beginnings is a Housing Support and Support Services program operated by the Assembly of Manitoba Chiefs (AMC). This non-Housing First initiative specifically targets Indigenous community members who are unhoused or precariously housed, assisting them in securing permanent housing. By offering tailored services, New Beginnings provides a clear pathway to stability, addressing the specific needs of each participant to facilitate their transition to a secure living situation.

The program offers comprehensive Economic Integration services designed to bolster the financial well-being of participants. These services include employment training, job placement assistance, and financial literacy education, all aimed at equipping participants with the skills and knowledge necessary for economic self-sufficiency. This strategic support ensures participants are well-prepared for a sustainable transition to stable and permanent housing.

New Beginnings also focuses on fostering an inclusive environment that encourages participants to thrive and successfully integrate into their communities. By providing structured support and resources, the program not only assists with housing stability but also contributes to the overall well-being of participants, enhancing their ability to engage with and contribute to their communities effectively.

The Project delivers essential housing setup services for individuals who have recently secured housing. The Transportation Assistant project processes referrals and requests for assistance from other Housing First Reaching Home participants. This component of the program is vital for ensuring that participants have the resources they need to successfully transition into their new living environments.

The facility offers a comprehensive array of Client Support Services along with essential needs such as food, places to shower and rest, and access to hygiene products. These services are enhanced by culturally appropriate supports like guidance from Elders and the opportunity to participate in traditional ceremonies. This holistic approach is designed to ensure that guests receive not only immediate physical care but also the spiritual and emotional support necessary for healing and recovery. to secure and maintain housing while delivering wrap-around services in a culturally conscious manner that meets people where they are.

Through intensive case management (ICM), participants are supported to achieve meaningful growth by developing culturally relevant support networks, setting and working toward personal goals, building life skills, and strengthening community connections.

WCW's Housing Placement and Support services include assistance with housing setup costs, short-term rental expenses, and rehousing costs. In addition, participants have access to basic needs support, life skills development, travel assistance, and cultural supports and activities. These services ensure that each participant's housing experience is stable, sustainable, and reflective of their individual needs and choices.

The recent program expansion added 15 new Housing First spaces, bringing the total to 80 participants. To support this growth, a newly funded Care Planner position will take on part of the expanded caseload, while a new Drop-In Mentor position has been introduced to engage with participants who are not yet connected to a Care Planner. The Drop-In Mentor provides crisis de-escalation support, wellness checks, and basic needs supplies through the drop-in space, fostering a stronger sense of stability and connection among participants.

Ma Mawi Wi Chi Itata Astum Api Niikinaahk Itata	Astum Api Niikinaahk is a Housing Supports and Support Services project operated by Ma Mawi Wi Chi Itata. The project provides 22 lowbarrier, affordable permanent supportive housing units, including four accessible units. These units are specifically designed for individuals experiencing unsheltered homelessness or those at risk of becoming homeless. The facility includes a lodge that delivers a range of cultural services and programs, creating a supportive and enriching environment for residents. The project prioritizes round-the-clock staff availability to offer individualized and flexible supports for residents facing significant challenges, including physical or mental health issues, disabilities, or substance abuse. Sunshine House	Zaagi Toowaad	Zaagi Toowaad, which means 'If They Like It' is a Prevention/Shelter Diversion project operated by Siloam Mission. The project is tailored to support 2SLGBTQ+ individuals, with a focus on those who are Indigenous, Black, and racialized, and who are at risk of homelessness or have previous experience with homelessness. The Zaagi Toowaad Program engages in minor crisis intervention and works to prevent housing breakdowns by providing immediate connections to appropriate services. The aim is to avoid the use of shelter spaces whenever possible, ensuring that participants receive the direct support needed to maintain stable housing. Additionally, Zaagi Toowaad assists participants in developing materials and training resources to facilitate knowledge translation among community members. This project empowers individuals to confidently navigate various systems independently, enhancing their ability to sustain housing stability and successfully integrate into their communities. comprehensive, barrier-free wrap-around supports.

The SNP provides a range of crucial services to support these youth, including advocacy, assistance with accessing housing resources, EIA support, help with obtaining identification and opening bank accounts, and accessing medical and mental health supports. Additionally, the program offers harm reduction, life skill building, addiction supports, crisis support, and daily necessities such as access to phone, computer, shower/hygiene facilities, and food at their drop-in center located at 175 Mayfair Ave, open six days per week.

The program offers both short-term crisis supports and long-term case planning through a person-centered, trauma-informed, and culturally informed framework. Operating under a rapid re-housing model, the SNP aims to swiftly move youth from homelessness to stable housing while providing continuous support to navigate the complex barriers they face, ensuring they receive the tailored help needed to secure and maintain housing stability.

Housing First

Housing First operated by The Link provides housing and support services for youth aged 12-24 who are at risk of or experiencing homelessness. The program focuses on securing and maintaining permanent housing through services such as tenancy support, case management, and re-housing when

needed. Participants are offered essential items like furniture and household supplies, ensuring they are set up for success in their housing journey. skills The program emphasizes life development, such as budgeting, cooking, and tenant education, empowering youth to achieve self-sufficiency. Additional supports include advocacy, connections to income assistance programs, cultural resources, and social networking opportunities. Additionally, the program helps youth maintain stable housing and create positive rental histories by fostering strong relationships with landlords and teaching eviction prevention strategies. The program aims to ensure long-term housing

The program aims to ensure long-term housing stability, with 80% of youth remaining housed by the end of the program. Through individualized support, youth are connected to community resources, cultural services, and social networks, enabling them to build a foundation for independence and long-term success.

The Watt Street project is a capital project that will facilitate the development of a 26-unit (80 bedrooms) transitional housing complex for women and families who are vulnerable or at risk of gender-based violence, and who are or at-risk of experiencing homelessness.

The Loving Roof	The Loving Roof (TLR) is a Housing Supports and Support Services project operated by Wahbung. This project is specifically designed to assist participants and their families who are experiencing or at risk of homelessness due to family violence. By focusing on this vulnerable group, TLR aims to offer a critical lifeline during times of need. The Loving Roof program facilitates access to safe and secure housing by operating two three-bedroom transitional housing suites. These accommodations serve as temporary housing solutions where individuals and their families can find safety and stability away from violence. The environment provided by TLR is conducive to healing and rebuilding, offering a sanctuary where families can stay together during transitional periods. In addition to housing, TLR provides comprehensive support services to help participants manage and overcome the challenges associated with family violence and homelessness. Their housing attainment program offers two streams: More Than Four Walls and H.O.M.E.S. The More Than Four Walls program utilizes the Housing First Model and provides an Intensive Case Management approach to assist individuals obtain and maintain permanent housing. Participants who are ineligible for More Than Four Walls and who require housing and income assistance are supported through WCWRC's H.O.M.E.S program. More Than Four Walls participants receive weekly home visits to address any potential issues that could impact their housing security. Participants in both programs are supported to establish, and implement individualized goals and action plans, with a primary focus on housing stability moving towards independence. Both programs also offer individualized life skills coaching and referrals to internal and external resources to address the needs of participants as identified in their individualized action plans and goals. units (28-30 bedrooms), with supportive services from partners such as Family Dynamics and Ikwe Widdjiitiwin. The housing will offer wraparound services to help residents transition to long-term stability.

The project ensures affordability by capping rent at 30% of household income and supports participants with housing, income testing, and culturally appropriate programs. Its goal is to help families move from transitional stays to secure, stable housing.

Key outcomes include the creation of 11 new housing units, with a focus on reducing homelessness and improving the quality of life for families through secure housing and comprehensive support.
